# ESL

## Level 1

•Sound symbol recognition (alphabet) survival skills, letters to words write your name in English. Preliteracy

## Level 2

•Beginning listening, reading speaking and writing common phrases and present tense of the verb “site words”

## Level 3

•Continuing speaking and listening practice, recognizing words and phrases in every day life: signs, advertisements, etc.

## Level 4

•Introduce past tense, read from authentic texts talking about past events. Use students’ needs and wants to talk about personal information . Introduce continuous and perfect forms present and past . Write sentences using correct tense.

## Level 5

•Build on students’ knowledge and accuracy in English. Write sentences and short paragraphs Demonstrate recognition, comprehension and pronunciation of an increasingly complex vocabulary. Read and summarize short passages from texts.

## Level 6

•Read and write for transition to academic English course work. Identify new vocabulary and build on an understanding of the meaning of words and phrases from the context. Write narrative and descriptive passages, be able to summarize what has been said or read, state an opinion and give reasons to support it. Report information to peers presenting in class. Students passing this class with a C grade or better may take English 98 or ESL 98.

# ABE

## Level 1

- Math: Writing whole numbers in word form, identifying whole numbers in word form, adding & subtracting whole numbers
- Communication Skills: pre-literate, identifying words, basic spelling and vocabulary

## Level 2

- Math: Multiplying whole numbers & dividing whole numbers
- Communication Skills: basic spelling and vocabulary, identifying words, understanding capitalization and punctuation.

## Level 3

- Math: Understanding, adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing decimals and fractions.
- Communication Skills: spelling and vocabulary, identifying simple sentences, further understanding of capitalization, punctuation and grammar.

## Level 4

- Math: Understanding, adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing percentages, and prealgebra and basic geometry.
- Communication Skills: spelling and vocabulary, identifying simple and compound sentences, understanding paragraph structure, understanding capitalization, punctuation, and grammar, review and understanding of different types of writing and organization.

## Level 5

- Math: Review of all math concepts from level 1 - 4, order of operations, algebra with one variable, geometry, trigonometry, exponents.
- Communication Skills: Review of all communication skills from previous levels, plus 5 paragraph essay structure, understanding revision and drafts, etc.
