



GENERAL INFORMATION

Humanity is diverse and so are the social, political, and economic relationships it creates. This program emphasizes the development of the essential skills and understanding needed to participate competently in these complex situations, to communicate cross-culturally, and to think critically. Diversity Studies focuses on underrepresented groups and emphasizes the historical and cultural bases for race, ethnicity, social class, age, gender, sexual orientation, ableness, and religious beliefs, both within American society and at the global level.

A strong commitment to social justice, civil rights, and human rights is core to the diversity education perspective. EvCC encourages all students to become informed citizens and advocates for human equality in all aspects of their lives, both public and private.

PROGRAM OPTIONS

Endorsement in Diversity Studies

This 25-credit program is designed for students interested in developing skills that are particularly useful in the workplace, including public schools. The program of study begins with a survey of cultural and social systems and is followed by an introductory diversity course. Students choose an area of emphasis and also complete one world language course.

Option II Degree

Students pursuing a transfer program that leads to further study in issues of diversity may follow the enclosed checklist. This transfer program focuses on foundational understanding of sociology, survey coursework to provide an overview of history and issues, and concentrated study in three areas to develop knowledge of cultures in the United States, experiences outside of the United States, and contemporary social issues. Development of cross-cultural communication skills, including a world language, is emphasized. Students also participate in a community service project before completing the degree.

GLOBAL STUDIES PROGRAM

EvCC offers a related program in global education which emphasizes the study of international issues within a multidisciplinary framework.
