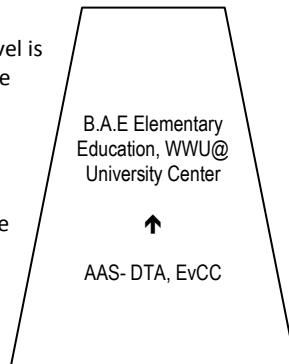
This guide is focused on earning teacher certification locally through the University Center on the EvCC campus. Classes are offered in Gray Wolf Hall, evenings and weekends.

Need help making choices? EvCC offers EDUC& 202, Introduction to Education, a course that helps students learn more about the teaching profession and whether it is right for them.

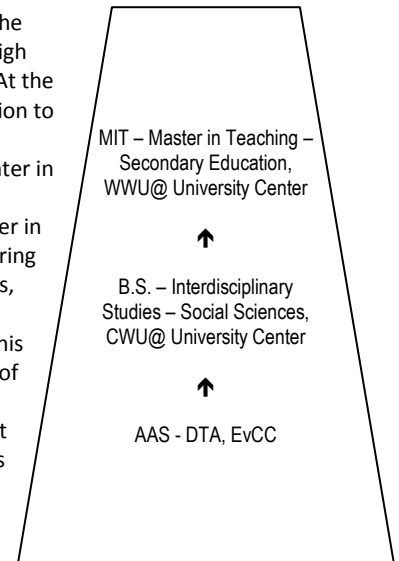
“How can I earn certification to teach at the elementary level?”

A pathway to certification at the elementary level is available by following the EvCC curriculum guide titled “Elementary Education”. Go to www.everettcc.edu/cguides and click on Elementary Education. This pathway includes earning an Associate in Arts and Sciences – Direct Transfer (DTA) at EvCC, as specified in the Elementary Education curriculum guide, and then transferring to the Elementary Education program for the degree of Bachelor of Arts in Education offered by Western Washington University at the University Center, or to another university..



“How can I earn certification to teach at the secondary level?”

A pathway to certification at the secondary level (middle and high school) requires more steps. At the time of this printing, certification to teach at the secondary level is available at the University Center in Everett through Western Washington University’s Master in Teaching (MIT) program, offering endorsements in Social Studies, Math, Science and English Language Arts. Eligibility for this program requires completion of a Bachelor’s degree or the equivalent in the endorsement subject area, including courses that are specific preparation for the endorsement. **This guide outlines how to earn certification to teach social studies at the secondary level by completing an associate degree through EvCC, a bachelor’s degree through CWU, and a master’s degree with teacher certification from WWU.**



If you want to teach Math, Science, English Language Arts or some other subject at the secondary level, you will have to earn your Bachelor’s degree elsewhere. See “External Options” on page 4.

Pathway to Secondary Education Teacher Certification with an Endorsement in Social Studies in Everett:

- **Step 1: Everett Community College, Associate in Arts and Sciences - DTA, page 2**
- **Step 2: Central Washington University, Bachelor of Science, Interdisciplinary Studies – Social Science, page 3**
- **Step 3: Western Washington University, Master in Teaching – Secondary, page 4**

This pathway assists two types of students:

- 1) Those who are starting their education at Everett Community College with an eye toward earning certification to teach social studies at the secondary level, and
- 2) Those who have completed some or all of their education elsewhere, but still need some more courses to prepare for the endorsement in social studies.

The checklist on page two identifies those courses that can be taken at EvCC to help students meet the requirements for an endorsement in Social Studies. This associate degree also meets the first-and second year general education requirements for Central Washington University. On page three, a list of courses offered by Central Washington University is provided. Page four describes Western Washington University’s Master in Teaching program.

Associate in Arts and Sciences - DTA

This checklist is for students preparing for a teacher certificate with an endorsement in social studies. It should be maintained while at Everett Community College. It will be submitted with a diploma application to the Enrollment Services Office the quarter before completion. Please refer to curriculum guide titled "Associate in Arts and Sciences – DTA" for approved courses for the various distribution requirements. Foreign language is not required in the DTA degree, but some universities require two or three quarters of foreign language for admission or graduation. Spanish is recommended for education students.

Total: Minimum 90 credits required, with a 2.0 minimum cumulative GPA.

Note 1: Courses must be from 3 different disciplines. No more than 10 credits in any one discipline may be used in Humanities, Social Science, and Natural Science altogether. No more than 5 credits may be used in any foreign language as part of the Humanities requirement. **Note 2:** A GPA higher than 2.0 may be required for admission to a teacher certification program. **Note 3:** Some universities will accept up to 105 credits from a community college; check with a university advisor.

*These EvCC courses meet WWU Social Studies endorsement requirements.

Central Washington University

Bachelor of Science in Interdisciplinary Studies – Social Sciences

The Bachelor of Science degree in Interdisciplinary Studies (IDS)– Social Sciences is offered by Central Washington University (CWU) through the University Center on EvCC’s campus. It is designed for students who are interested in broader options in course selection than are possible within a traditional departmental major and/or who want to specialize their course of study according to individual interests and professional/educational aspirations. Persons holding this degree will find employment in a variety of occupations, ranging from corporate to social and educational services, depending upon their primary emphasis among the various disciplines within the social science category. This degree also provides excellent preparation for graduate studies in psychology, sociology, social work, political science and education.

Students are qualified to apply for this degree program if they have completed a transfer associate degree or 90 transferable college credits. Students interested in secondary education in social studies are strongly encouraged to complete the checklist on the previous page.

To help meet requirements for the social studies endorsement, the following table lists those courses that should be included within the 90-credits of Central Washington University’s upper-division IDS degree program. These courses are offered in-person, online, and via video-conference. Please work closely with your CWU advisor to determine how to plan your class schedules to include these courses. (This table also lists equivalent courses offered by Western Washington University, either in Bellingham or through web delivery, to meet the endorsement in social studies, and may be useful in case scheduling issues prevent you from completing CWU’s courses. Note: Registration in Western’s courses should first be approved by CWU advisor; registration must occur with Western.)

Western Washington University

Master in Teaching – Secondary Education

The Master in Teaching (MIT) program is offered through the University Center on the EvCC campus, by Western Washington University.

The Master in Teaching program attracts recent bachelor's degree holders, as well as adult students with employment experience from many different fields and professions, who have decided that high school, middle school, or junior high school teaching offers an exciting career alternative. The students' professional preparation consists of 74 quarter credit hours that are completed over 8 quarters of academic study, which include 2 quarters of internship (student teaching) and one additional quarter to complete the degree. There are also credits for pedagogy courses for each endorsement area that are in addition to the 74 credits but included within the program. (The number of credits for pedagogy varies by endorsement area.) This leads to certification to teach at the secondary level.

Applications will be considered from candidates with Bachelor's degrees or the equivalent in: Social Studies, English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science. Grades, subject area preparation, test scores, interviews and other material are considered in the admission process.

The associate degree checklist on page two, and completion of the IDS degree with the courses listed on page three, enable students to meet some of the key requirements for application to the MIT program with a Social Studies endorsement. If you are seeking an endorsement in the sciences, mathematics, or English language arts, you must complete the coursework at another institution before applying to the MIT program in Everett.
