WHAT IS A BIBLIOGRAPHY?

A bibliography is a list of books, magazine articles and other sources you have looked at while doing research for your paper. You do not have to quote from a source to include it in the bibliography.

HOW DOES THE BIBLIOGRAPHY LOOK?

The bibliography is in alphabetical order by the last name of the author. If there is not a listed author, the material is listed by the first meaningful word of the title.

Titles are underlined. Second lines are indented 10 spaces.

The bibliography lists:

1. Author's name (last name first)
2. Article title (in quotation marks)
3. Book or magazine title (underlined)
4. Publishing company
5. Place of publication
6. Date of publication

(Sometimes this order is varied. Check to see what order your instructor prefers and then be consistent.)

EXAMPLES:

Book:

Coupland, R. East Africa and Its Invaders. Claredon Press, Oxford, 1938.

Magazine, Article:

Ward, Herbert. "The Tale of a Tusk of Ivory," Scribner's Magazine, 8 (November, 1890), 531-545.

MOST BIBLIOGRAPHIES ARE PLACED ON A SEPARATE SHEET AT THE VERY END OF THE PAPER.

** Your footnotes and bibliography should be so complete that someone who doesn't know anything about the topic could use them to write your paper themselves.

Newspaper Article

Sheraton, Mimi. "Dining Dollars and Sense." The New York Times. July 24, 1982, Section 2, p 46.

Encyclopedia Article

Conrad, Barnaby. "Bullfighting." Encyclopedia Britannica. 15th ed., III, pp. 476-478.

Selection in a Edited Collection

Lesser, Gerald S. "Stop Picking on Big Bird." In Television and American Culture. ed. Carl Lowe. New York: The H. W. Wilson Company, 1981.

Revised or Later Edition

Stoessinger, John G. Why Nations Go To War. 3d ed. New York: St Martin's Press, Inc., 1982.

Pamphlet

Irwin, Theodore. Watch Your Blood Pressure. Pamphlet No. 483B. New York: The Public Affairs Committee, 1979.

Television Program
